# Executive Director, The Architectural League of New York, 1985-2023.

As Executive Director from February 1985 through June 2023, Rosalie Genevro shaped and pursued the League's mission of nurturing excellence and stimulating discussion and debate on issues in architecture, design and urbanism. The League's programs and publications present the work of the world's best-known architects as well as emerging talents, create opportunities for investigation and innovation, and focus attention and influence opinion on critical issues in the built environment.

Working with the League's staff and as director of specific projects, Ms. Genevro engaged a wide range of public forums and platforms to present both recognized and nascent work in architecture, design, and urbanism to New York, national, and international audiences. Ms. Genevro organized design studies, directed exhibitions, initiated digital publications, conceived and edited print publications, and guided the creation of live public events including lectures, panels, conferences, symposia, and roundtable discussions. The New York City-focused design studies she directed include "Vacant Lots," on affordable infill housing for small sites, "New Schools for New York," on design and development strategies to create small public schools, "The Productive Park," on parks and the water supply, "Envisioning East New York," and "Arverne: Housing on the Edge." Digital projects include worldviewcities.org, presenting reports by local young architects on out-of-the mainstream cities around the world, and urbanomnibus.net, a publication, focused on New York, that raises new questions, illuminates diverse perspectives, and documents creative projects to advance the collective work of citymaking. She directed the creation of major traveling exhibitions, including "Renzo Piano Building Workshop: Selected Projects," "Ten Shades of Green: Architecture and the Natural World" and "Urban Life: Housing in the Contemporary City." Other major multi-format projects included "The Five Thousand Pound Life: Architecture, Climate Change, and our Economic Future" and "American Roundtable," commissioned reports by nine editor/reporter teams about the interaction of the built environment with issues including health and economy in specific rural areas and small cities around the United States.
